Explore: renting and furnishing an apartment; handling relationships; balancing a checkbook; using credit cards - responsibly; making and sticking to a budget; major and minor purchases; shopping and planning meals; and dealing with life’s difficult decisions.

- #2 Pencil and eraser
- 2- 1 Subject notebooks- (one MUST be left in the classroom)
- Pocket folder

SUGGESTED SUPPLIES:

- ◆ Tissues, Paper Plates, Cups, and/or Paper Towels for Extra Credit

GRADING:

Q= Quality; work is done according to standards identified in class

NQY= Not Quality Yet; work needs improvement to meet class standards.

Grades are determined based upon the school grading policy.

DAILY GRADES INCLUDE:

1. Work completed in class examples include study sheets, mini projects, reports, worksheets, and class notes. Each can be made up in the case of an excused absence.
2. Class Participation Grade examples include question of the day, positive class participation, guest speaker notes, and field trips. Each of these **cannot** be made up if student is absent. Exceptions will be made in the case of religious observation, field trips, and college visits. Usually worth 2-15 points. Extra credit assignments will be assigned through out the semester which can be used to supplement any missed class participation assignments.
3. Lab Class Grade: For the duration of the semester there will be food lab experiences. Each food lab will be worth 100 points. Food Labs can be made up if excused absence; however, please attend as a respect to the other group members; your attendance and contribution to the group is essential so please try to be present to all labs.

*The food labs can be made up in two ways: The student can prepare the recipe at home with DOCUMENTED PROOF.

Requirements:

- Produce a video or take pictures of yourself preparing the recipe (must be you not just hands)
- One page typed summary answering the Cooking Lab Evaluation Questions
- An evaluation note from a parent

*The second way to make up a lab write a research paper about an assigned topic related to the missed cooking lab. The paper must use at least three sources and be at least three pages in length, MLA format.

4. Homework: At times, there will be homework assigned which is expected to be returned the next school day. In the case of an absence, homework can be made up, but it is **YOUR** responsibility to see the teacher the day you come back to retrieve missed assignments. Homework assignments are generally worth 10-20 points.

-Homework Citation: In the case of a homework assignment which is not turned in by the expected due date or a NQY assignment, the student will be issued a homework citation. This citation will be assigned by the teacher and will give a date in which the assignment must be completed. Assignments not completed by the date on the citation will result in a zero for the assignment. Parents will be notified after three zeros resulting from homework citations.

TESTS:

Generally given 1-2 times per term, usually worth 150 points each. These can be made up in the case of an excused absence. The final exam for this class will be announced at a later date.

SERVICE LEARNING PROJECTS AND BOOK REPORTS:

Each student taking Life After Graduation will be required to complete a service learning project or book report assignment. Service Learning projects are special projects completed outside of class which allows the student to participate in a volunteer or educational project. To complete the service learning project, the student will be required to volunteer for a minimum of five hours at the location of their choice; however, the volunteer work **CANNOT** be somewhere where the student is already volunteering. Both projects must be approved by the teacher **PRIOR** to beginning the project. The service learning projects will be worth 250 points.

Grades are determined by adding up all the points earned by the student, dividing it by the total points available, resulting in a percentage grade. Grades are based on the schools grading scale. **5% is added to the final grade for perfect attendance (no absences excused or unexcused) and no tardies to class. Students missing school for religious observances, field trips, and college visits will still have the opportunity to earn the bonus points.**

MISSED WORK: Students will be allowed one day for every excused absence to make up work.

MISSED OR LATE PAPERS AND PROJECTS:

-Will result in homework citation and will also receive the following point reduction:

- One day late= 10% off the score
- Two days late= 25% off the score
- Three to Five days late= 50% credit given for the assignment
- Beyond Five days= 0 credit

CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR:

***APPROPRIATE CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR IS
EXPECTED! REMEMBER I AM AN EDUCATOR NOT
YOUR BABYSITTER! 😊***

1. Be respectful of yourself, others, equipment, and property!
 - Treat others with respect the way you wish to be treated!
 - Be nice!
 - Use appropriate language. Obscene gestures, behaviors, and comments are strictly prohibited. Inappropriate language will earn an office referral.
 - Stay in your seat unless instructed otherwise. Areas of the classroom that are off limits to students include: the staff bathroom, the outside door, any cabinet labeled for teacher use only, the teacher computer and desk, and the food closet.
 - Horseplay will not be tolerated. Horseplay will result in immediate removal from the classroom for the day.
 - No writing on desks or in books or other school property.
 - Absolutely no sleeping in class. Sleeping in class will result in immediate loss of participation points for the day.

2. Be Accountable!
 - Be in your seat when the bell rings.
 - Attend school regularly
 - Bring all materials to class
 - Participate in group activities and class discussions.
 - Express opinions properly
 - All school rules apply in class
3. Be Courteous
 - Do not talk when others are talking,
 - Raise your hand to speak.
4. What is said by other students in class stays in class
 - Due to the sensitivity of the topics discussed in class do not divulge the personal business of others. In other words don't gossip.
5. Report to class on time!
 - Each student will be allowed three free tardies per semester. Any tardy after will result in an office referral.

CELL PHONES IN THE CLASSROOM:

Cell phones are strictly prohibited in the FCS classroom. Students who choose to have a cell phone in school need to leave the cell phone off and out of sight for the duration of the class period unless otherwise given permission by the teacher. Students who choose to violate this rule will be dealt the following consequences: (any cell phone issue will be dealt with outside of classroom learning time)

1st offense: Verbal warning from teacher

2nd offense: Cell phone taken away for the duration of the class period, written warning and phone call or e-mail home

3rd offense: Cell phone taken away for class period and detention assigned with classroom teacher (students failing to comply or show up will move to the 4th offense consequence) and phone call or e-mail home

4th offense and beyond: Cell phone taken away and given to assistant principal of discipline along with an office disciplinary referral.

Persistent cell phone issues could result in removal from the classroom and loss of participation points for the class period*

CONSEQUENCES:

Following the rules and positive behavior results in improved learning opportunities for fun, treats, good news calls and positive notes home, and celebrations.

Breaking the rules results in discussion of the behavior and rules, and providing opportunities for correction. Further problems with behavior will result in a behavior referral, phone calls home, and/or a loss of positive class participation points.

SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS AND GUESTS IN THE CLASS:

Substitute teachers and guests are to be treated with the utmost respect and dignity. Any problems will be considered serious and will be dealt with when the teacher returns. All class behavior should be according to class policies. Any negative feedback about a student's behavior from a substitute will result in an automatic office referral. On the other hand any positive observation about a particular student's behavior by a substitute will result in 5 extra credit points.

VIDEO AND MOVIE USE

During the semester, there may be times when a blockbuster movie is shown that is relevant to classroom material. The movie will be rated either G, PG, or PG13. There may be some obscene language, some violent content, and some content of the sexual nature. Your child will be informed at least two days before the movie is shown through a parental consent form which will need to be turned in prior to your child viewing the video will be required for movies rated PG13 or higher. There will be an option to opt out of the video with an alternative assignment. All movies shown are screened for appropriateness for teenagers.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUCCESS:

Remember that in life everything is a choice including learning! You will get back what you put into this class, and I would suggest, putting in 110%. I will always be available to help you in the learning process. Never be afraid to ask questions! Finally, come to class prepared and be ready to take on the adventure of learning that will be presented before you.
